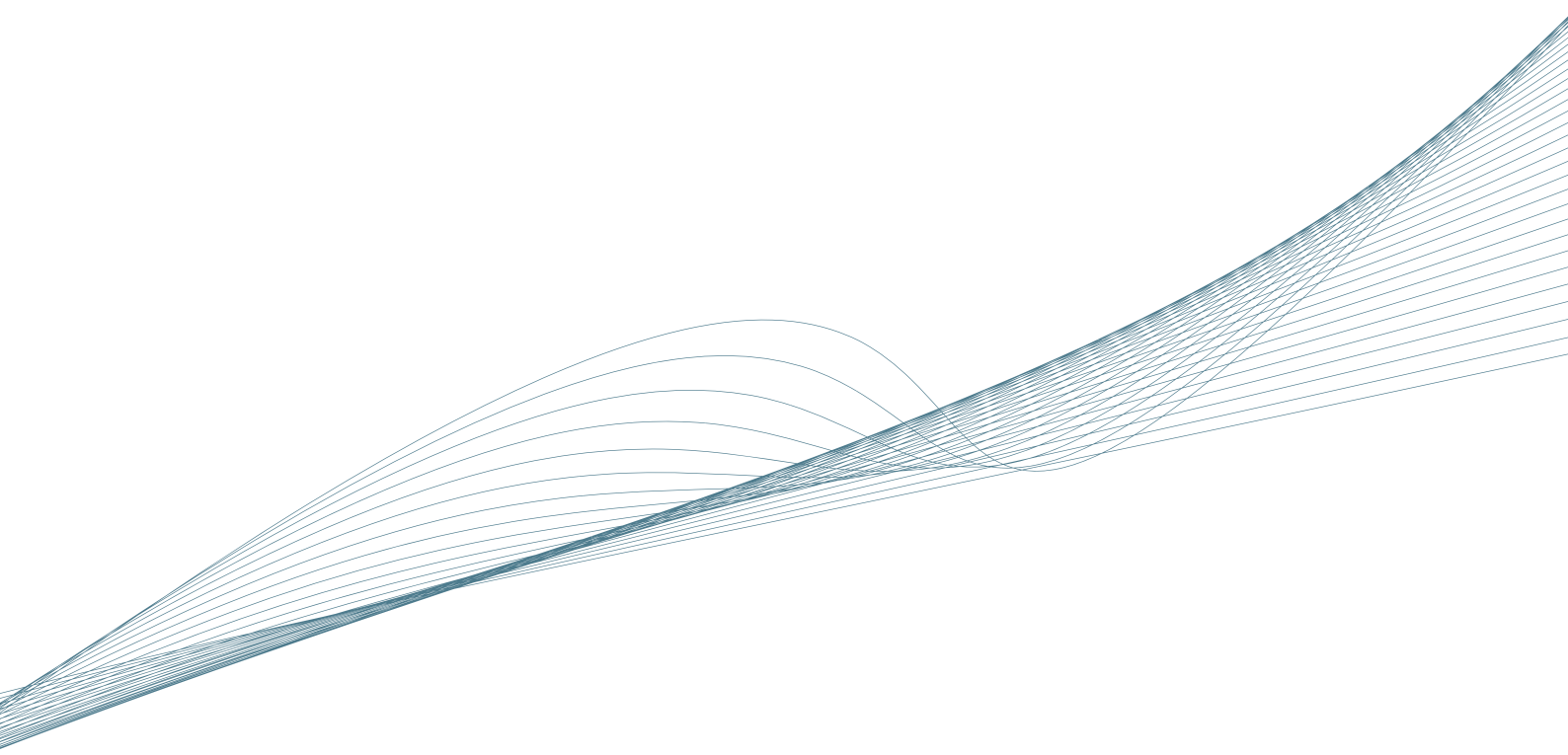

## SIR WILLIAM PATEY KCMG GOVERNMENT AND INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS ADVISER

---

Sir William is Government and International Relations Adviser for Control Risks. He sits on Control Risks' Executive Committee, advising the company on key questions of international operations and relationships with government entities.

Sir William recently retired from a distinguished career in the Diplomatic Service. His most recent appointment, from May 2010 through April 2012, was as Her Majesty's Ambassador to Afghanistan. Previous appointments included Ambassador to Sudan starting in 2002, during negotiations for a comprehensive peace agreement between the Government of Khartoum and the southern rebels (SPLA). In June 2005 he was appointed Ambassador to Iraq and served there for 14 months, during the drafting and passing in a referendum of the new Iraqi Constitution. He left Baghdad at the end of July 2006 and until his appointment as Ambassador to Saudi Arabia in April 2007, he served as the Director of the Comprehensive Spending Review programme in the Foreign Office.

Earlier in his diplomatic career, Sir William worked on the Rhodesia, Libya/Syria and Iran/Iraq desks, and was posted to Abu Dhabi, Tripoli, Canberra and Riyadh. He also served as Deputy Head of the Diplomatic Service's United Nations Department.

Sir William read Modern History at the University of Dundee from 1971 to 1975, and early in his time at the Diplomatic Service studied Arabic at the FCO's Middle East Centre for Arabic Studies in Lebanon.

Sir William was appointed Knight Commander of the Order of St Michael and St George (KCMG) in 2009.



## ROELF MEYER ADVISOR

Roelof Petrus (Roelf) Meyer was born on 16 July 1947 in the Eastern Cape, South Africa. He matriculated in 1964 and completed his BComm (1968) and LLB (1971) degrees at the University of the Free State. He practiced as a lawyer in Pretoria and Johannesburg before entering politics as a Member of Parliament in 1979. He resigned from active politics after 21 years at the end of January 2000. During this period he served as Deputy Minister of Law and Order and as Deputy Minister of Constitutional Development (1968-1991), and subsequently as Minister of Defence and as Minister of Constitutional Affairs (1991-1996).

As chief negotiator for the National Party (NP) government, Roelf Meyer was intimately involved in the negotiations on the settlement of the South African conflict. In this capacity he negotiated the end of apartheid together with Cyril Ramaphosa, who was chief negotiator for the African National Congress (ANC). These negotiations resulted in the first democratic elections in South Africa at the end of April 1994. After the elections Roelf continued in the portfolio of Constitutional Affairs in the cabinet of former President Nelson Mandela.

In addition to his work with Control Risks, Roelf is currently a businessperson and acts as a consultant on peace processes. In this capacity he became involved in various countries around the globe – Northern Ireland, Sri Lanka, Rwanda, Burundi, Kosovo and Bolivia - as well as in the Basque Region and the Middle East. He serves on the Strategy Committee of the Project on Justice in Times of Transition in New York and held the Tip O'Neill Chair in peace studies at the University of Ulster, Northern Ireland, in 2001.
